11. INTEGRITY

Bav addition to west facade ca. 1888-93; bay enlargement to west facade and porch addition to north facade ca. 1893-88; bay addition to east facade and removal of porch from north facade ca. 1888-1903. Some records of structural alterations/additions are available at the City of Corning Building Department.

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

Situated on the south side of East First Street. this residence is one of a row of nineteenth and early twentieth century homes of various styles. These houses have varying setbacks from the street and are fairly consistent in their east to west spacing.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE:

Designed predominantly in the Gothic Revival style of architecture with some influence of the Stick style of architecture, this large structure displays an innovative mix of elements. As noted in A Field Guide to American Houses (McAlester), the residence's Gothic Revival features include: a parallel-hipped roof interrupted by cross gables with cross-braced vergeboard; second-floor lancet windows; gabled roof dormers with side walls; and an overall design which emphasizes verticality. In terms of Stick features, the building exhibits diagonal, flat stickwork and decorative horizontal banding.

The first one and one half stories of the building's northern end and the full two stories of the southern end are covered with clapboards. The first story is highlighted by bays on the north, east, and west facades. A one-story porch, composed of a pointed arch and two pairs of ornately-carved vertical supports, demarcates the northern recessed entrance. The top one and one half stories of the building's northern end are covered with board and batten cladding which is interrupted by paired lancet windows underneath the cross gables on the north and east facades.

The residence also features four, large brick chimneys with recessed lancet motifs, a rough-cut, regular-coursed local stone foundation, and a 3'-0"-high wrought iron fence which encloses the building's front and side yards.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

From 1873-1902. 44 East First Street was owned by James A. Drake. President of the First National Bank of Corning in the 1890s. In 1874. Drake became part owner of the M.D. Walker and Company. Which constructed the Corning Court House in 1903. In 1905, the Drake interest in M.D. Walker and Company was purchased by other partners, and the Company was incorporated as the Corning Building Company, which had a significant impact on the city's physical development.

The house was never occupied by James A. Drake, but rather by his brother, Charles E. Drake, who was part owner of Millspaugh & Drake, a local wholesale and retail hardware company which specialized in agricultural implements.

By 1903, 44 East First street was converted into multi-family housing. Building residents of the early and middle twentieth century included employees of local industry such as the New York Central Railroad. The maintenance of affordable multi-family housing such as this has consistently allowed for a broad range in types of people to reside in the area, and consequently contributes to the stability of the Southside neighborhood.

As per our final inspection of the structure on August 30, it was decided that the building must be demolished and removed from the site.


