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11c. MAJOR ALTERATIONS AND DATES:

After 1948, a shed-roofed addition was added to the south side of the house. It is built on a rubble stone foundation and is sided to match the house. In 1984, the upstairs bedroom was enlarged by removing a partition.

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

The houses on the south side of East Fifth street between Pine and Cedar streets have an even setback, but inconsistent east-to-west spacing. The lots of this block are quite large, as are the houses. The styles on this block range from Queen Anne Style to Dutch Colonial Revival Style to Italian Villa Style???

This house is bounded on either side by open space. The grade drops steeply from the house towards the west, and then levels off. There are sandstone walks on the property, as well as a bulkhead at the southwest corner of the house. The grade also drops sharply from the house toward the north.

Prior to 1948, two different garages occupied a rear portion of the property. Currently, there is a modern four-car garage with wood shingles.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE:

This cross-gable gambrel roofed house is two-and-a-half stories high. It is of the Dutch Colonial Revival Style which is characterized by its gambrel roof. The Colonial Style elements include the eliptical windows and the front door surronds. The front door is flanked by leaded glass side lights and has a half-elliptical leaded transom window. Additionally, there are very thin colonettes that accent the front door.

The exterior wall material of the house is wood shingles and the foundation is of rough cut stone. There are two exterior chimneys on the house.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

This house is constructed on the center third of Lot #3 and #4 of Block 54 as laid out in the 1855 Brewer and Canfield map of Corning. The house was constructed by Henry P. Sinclaire, Jr. who was the secretary of the Corning Flint Glass Company and later the secretary for the T.G. Hawkes Company. Eventually, Sinclaire founded his own glass company, This company, H.P. Sinclaire & Co. was founded in 1904. Marvin Olcott, a prominent real estate investor, was a silent partner in this business. This company was Corning's engraving specialist and the glass was sold coast to coast and in Canada. H.P. Sinclaire & Co. was in operation until 1928.
