11c. MAJOR ALTERATIONS AND DATES:

Between 1903 and 1908, the southeast corner of the house was extended from one story to two stories. It may have been at this time that the northwest corner of the house was changed from an open porch into an enclosure. The shingles of this addition match those of the original. In addition, the east side porch and the front porch were connected to form a wrap-around porch. Some time after 1948, the wrap-around porch was altered in shape and enclosed. This enclosed porch has multi-light casement windows with transom windows above. Inside this porch, there is finished wood flooring. The porch is on a parged foundation with a basement below.

A large plate glass window replaced several smaller windows in the turret at the northwest corner of the house. At the western facade, a small attached tool shed was added. It has clapboard siding and is on concrete

piers.

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

The houses on the south side of East Fifth Street between Pine and Cedar Street have an even set back, but are inconsistent in their east-to-west spacing. The lots of this block are quite large, as are the houses. The styles on this block range from Queen Anne to Dutch Colonial Revival to Italianate.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE:

This two-and-a-half story Queen Anne Style house is side gabled with two crossing gables at the rear. The first-story exterior wall surface is clapboard siding, while the second story is wood shingles. These shingles flair at the base. There are also wood shingles in the gable ends. The overall plan of the house is rectangular in shape. There are Queen Anne windows in the gable ends and the shingles round back towards these windows. There are scrolled brackets which support the projecting bay at the south or rear of the house. There are numerous cantilevers and bay windows in this Queen Anne Style house. At the east facade, there is a two-story half-round bay window. Additionally, there is an engaged turret at the northwest corner of the house.

There is an eyebrow window in the attic story at the north facade. The window in the house are, for the most part, one-over-one sash with unequal top and bottom sash. The top sash is smaller than that at the bottom.

There are many chimneys that are intricately corbelled. Some of the chimneys mix smooth brick, textured brick, and custom shaped brick with the corbelling. Some of the chimneys are very simple.

There are two entries to the house. The northern, or front entry, is partially enclosed within the glassed-in porch. The side, or east, entry is recessed within the porch, as well. The second story of the house cantilevers over this side entry. Within the porch, the door is recessed approximately ten feet.

The rear yard is terraced up with railroad tie retaining walls and there is a sandstone patio within the rear yard.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

This house is constructed in Block 54, occupying the northern half of lot 8 and part of lot 7, as laid out in the 1855 Brewer and Canfield map of Corning. Marvin Olcott had this house designed by the local architect, Henry C. Tuthill. It was then built by Mr. English. Marvin Olcott operated a prominent real estate business that was located at 13 East Market Street. Mr. Olcott had many real estate holdings in Corning. Additionally, he was a silent partner in H.P. Sinclaire, Jr.'s glass cutting business from 1904 until 1921.




