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11c. MAJOR ALTERATIONS AND DATES:

In 1903, a one-story porch was added to the eastern half of the southern facade of the house. Between 1913 and 1921, two one-story outbuildings were built at the back of the property on the northern boundary. In 1993, the garage was repaired and re-roofed. The westernmost building is a one-car garage. The eastern building was also one-story and has since been destroyed.

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

This late nineteenth-century house is situated on the eastern half of Lot 13, Block 69 (Brewer and Canfield Map of Corning, 1855). Its front faces south to West Fifth Street. The northern boundary is the access alley which bisects the block. There is a garage on the northern third of the property. Similar in size and style to its western neighbor, the house shares the same setback as the other houses on the street. There is equal spacing to the east and west. The lot slopes gently down to the north.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE:

This two-story, detached residence is typical of the gabled-ell-style of worker housing. The front gable faces south and features two bays punctuated by evenly spaced one-over-one windows. The one-story, covered entrance porch on the eastern edge of the main facade features a hipped roof, turned wood spindles, a carved frieze, and decorative brackets. The house is set on parged fieldstone and covered in asbestos shingles. The steeply-pitched gabled roof is covered in asphalt shingles. There is an interior cinder block chimney.

The one-story garage at the rear of the lot is a simple rectangular building. Its longitudinal axis runs north to south. The double doors open out to the north. The outbuilding is covered in simple-bevel, horizontal, wood clapboards. The roof is covered with asphalt shingles.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

In 1890, James Gavigan bought the entire Lot 13 for \$450.00. He then subdivided the property and sold the western half in 1891. Keeping the eastern half, he built this house. He sold it to the Cornng Co-operative Savings and Loan Association in 1902. They, in turn, sold it to Otelle Schosger, who lived lthere until 1945. Traditionally, this has been a working-class house. Residents have included glass blowers, railway men, and painters.
