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11c. MAJOR ALTERATIONS AND DATES:

In 1903, a one-story, cutaway porch was added at the southeastern corner of the front (south) facade. Between 1913 and 1920 a one-story garage was built on the northern third of the lot. This building has since been demolished. In 1987, vinyl siding was put on the house at a cost of \$5,800. The current owner is applying for a permit to enclose the front porch.

INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

This late nineteenth-century house is situated on the western half of Lot 13, Block 69 (Brewer and Canfield's Map of Corning, 1855). Its front faces south to West Fifth Street. The northern boundary is the access alley which bisects the block. The lot slopes gently down to the north. Similar in size and style to its eastern neighbor, the house shares the same setback as the other houses on the street. There is equal spacing to the east and west between it and its neighbors.

OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE:

This two-story, detached residence is typical of the gabled-ell-style of worker housing. The front gable faces south and features two bays punctuated by evenly spaced one-over-one windows. At thee eastern edge of the main facade is a cutaway-porch. The house is set on a parged field stone basement and is covered in vinyl siding. The windows are also vinyl. The steeply-pitched gabled roof is covered in asphalt shingles. There is a door in the western bay of the uuper story on the northern facade. A crude balcony prevents anyone from falling out of this opening.

HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: James Gavigan, a brakeman for the local railroad, bought all of Lot 13 in 1890. He subdivided the lot and sold the western half to John Lawless in 1891. Mr. Lawless, a painter, lived here until 1897. The current owners, Donald and Dorothy Daines, have lived here since 1959. This home is good example of vernacular housing.


