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## 11c. MAJOR ALTERATIONS AND DATES:

The one-story porch located on the principal facade was enclosed at a later date. According to Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps the porch was still open in 1930. The staircase leading up to the main entrance is not original. There are two one-story additions located on the rear (south) facade.

## 17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

Situated on the south side of East First Street, this residence is one of a row of midnineteenth/early twentieth century homes. These houses have similar setbacks from the street, but are somewhat inconsistent in their east to west spacing. Today many of the homes on this block have been converted to doctors' offices due to the close location of Corning Hospital.

## 18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE

Originally a single family residence, 130 East First Street is a two-story house designed in the "Dutch Colonial" Revival Style. The overall shape of the plan is rectangular, and three bays wide. Typical features of the "Dutch Colonial" Revival Style include the front facing gambrel intersected by a cross gambrel. Two gable dormer windows are present. A full length recessed porch, that has since been enclosed, extends the length on the principal facade. There is a great variety in window type, but most are nine-over-one double-hung sash. The fenestration pattern is irregular with the exception of the facade. There is a projecting bay on the first floor of the east facade. The building is constructed of clapboard siding set on a rough-cut coursed stone foundation. On the north facade the foundation is hidden by lattice skirting. The roof is covered by asphalt shingles. Notable features on the main facade include the oval window and two-sided oriel window. Two separate one story additions on the rear facade appeared between 1913 and 1921 replacing a one story porch. The front gable overhangs on the north, east, and west elevations.

# 20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE

This plot was originally part of Block 42, Lot 5 (the parcel of land where 124 E. First Street is located). The 1898 Sanborn Fire Insurance Map indicates that the property was divided and "[a] frame dwelling [was] to be built" on the current site of 130 East First Street. Arthur H. Tully, a glass worker, was most likely the first resident. In the 1899 Corning City Directory he is listed as boarding at 109 East First Street. In the

1903 Corning City Directory he is listed as living at 130 East First Street. Over the next twenty years Tully resided here and by 1907 he was an assistant supervisor for the Corning Glass Works. In 1915 he is listed as a superintendent of Metropolitan Life Insurance Company with an office in the First National Building.
