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11c. MAJOR ALTERATIONS AND DATES:

In 1917 the Greek Revival-style elements of 134 East First Street were removed and the building was thoroughly remodeled to display elements of the then-fashionable Tudor Revival Style. The overall plan and form of the building, however, have remained the same.

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

Situated on the south side of East First Street, this residence is one of a row of mid-nineteenth and early twentieth century homes. These houses have similar setbacks from the street, but are somewhat inconsistent in their east to west spacing. Historic photographs indicate that 134 East First Street was originally similar in style to the other Greek Revival-style homes located on East First Street.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE:

Originally a Greek Revival-style residence, the house located at 134 East First Street was remodeled on the exterior in 1917. It is now representative of the Tudor Revival Style. The overall form of the two-story house is essentially an L-shaped plan, projecting slightly in the western corner of the rear (south) facade. The main (north) facade is symmetrically organized. The low-pitched roof is front-gabled in the main (north) block and side-gabled in the rear (south). Elements of the Tudor Revival Style include the stucco and false half-timbering as well as the windows with multi-paned glazing, and the exposed rafters. The foundation is constructed of rough cut coursed ashlar. The original slate roof was removed and replaced with composition shingles in 1989. Other notable features include the one-story porch located the reentrant angle formed by the ell, and the one-story entrance portico on the main facade. The original two-story barn is still located at the rear of the property. It retains the Greek Revival-style detailing, including a wide cornice with returns which may have been similar to that which existed on the main house before its remodeling.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

In 1854 William Young conveyed Lot 6 Block 42 to Samuel C. Robertson. On March 28, 1867, Robertson sold the property to William Walker for \$2800. William Walker, an insurance, real estate, hats and gloves dealer lived here until his death in 1890 when he willed the property to his wife, Helen C. Walker. Mrs. Walker sold the property to Dr. Edward H. Hutton in 1907. It was during Hutton's ownership that the exterior of the house was remodeled. Dr. Hutton died on May 7, 1934 and willed the house to his wife, Alice. In 1937 Mrs. Hutton sold the property to Dr. Alexander




Dowling and his wife. Dr. Parker M. Hoffman purchased the house in 1947 and lived there until his death. Richard Pier bought the house in 1980 from Janet Hoffman, and converted it into The Rosewood Inn, a bed and breakfast establishment. The current owners, Stewart and Suzanne Sanders, purchased the Rosewood Inn in 1992.
