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11c. MAJOR ALTERATIONS AND DATES:

The footprint of the building as well as the massing have remained constant since its initial construction. Later alterations include the present cladding -- wood square butt shingles and the aluminum storm windows.

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

Situated on the north side of East Second Street, this residence is one of a row of mid-nineteenth/early twentieth century homes. These houses have similar setbacks from the street, but are somewhat inconsistent in their east to west spacing. The plot of land upon which the building is situated was originally part of the parcel of land for Block 42, lot 16 — the site of 147 East Second Street. It was divided betwen 1893-98, 145 East Second Street occupies the western half.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE:

145 East Second Street is an example of a two-and-a-half-story, four bay residence designed in the Queen Anne Style. The overall form of the house consists of a central rectangular block which extends slightly on the east facade, and a series of three gradual set backs moving from north to south on the west facade. Notable Queen Anne features of the house include the asymmetrical massing, the cut away bay located on the western half of the main facade, the two dominant front-facing open gables, the steep pitch of the roof, the small widow centered in the gable, and the porch that runs the length of the main facade and extends back terminating at the projection of the building on the western facade. The porch is constructed of square columns set on a parapet wall with paired columns and a front-gable marking the entrance. The windows are one-over-one double-hung sash.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

It is likely that this home served as a rental property. Willard S. Reed, a lawyer whose office was located in the Drake Building lived here in 1903. In 1905 Dennis Driscoll was living here. Cloit C. Almy, a teller with the State Bank of Corning resided at this address in 1907. Barthololmew V. Keefe, a grocer whose store was located at 128 Pine Street lived here from 1909 through at least 1912.
