16 OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE

This gable-front with ellinouse has some of the decurative elements of the Queen Anne Style in particular, the three-part bay on the eastern lacade gives the bouse a somewhat irregular wall plane. The windows in this bay unlike the rest on the nouse, are two-over-two double-hung sash. The windows on the house are generally one-over-one double-hung sash with the exception of two fixes windows on the secondary (acades.
