Although this house dates to the early twentieth century, its setback matches those of older, late nineteenth century homes on the north side of East Second Street. While its Queen Anne massing produces the effect of considerable size, this house is medium in scale when compared with others on the block.

This house lies on one-half of a city lot. On the rear or north half of the lot is $71^1/_2$ East Second Street, a Greek Revival house. The older house previously occupied the position 71 East Second does now.

11c. MAJOR ALTERATIONS: One significant alteration to the original design is a rear two story porch raised on wooden piers. On the first floor, the porch has a closed balustrade sheathed in wooden clapboards. On the second floor, a wrought iron railing surrounds the deck.

Also, a recent addition (ca. 1980 - 1990) was made to the front porch, extending the original deck several feet beyond the supporting piers.

- 15i. LANDSCAPE FEATURES: On this site, the land slopes away from the street, so that the house lies below the grade of the road and the rear of the basement is exposed.
- 18. NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE: Architecturally, 71 East Second Street exemplifies the transition between the Queen Anne and Colonial Revival styles. Its massing and form are Queen Anne-style features, especially the clipped corners and projecting bays. Its detailing, however, is Colonial Revival. Prominent examples of such details are the pedimented central front dormer with Doric pilasters, and the hipped roof of the full-length, one-story front porch.


This house is square in plan, but the main hipped roof is intersected by rear cross gables. The west cross gable terminates in a two-and-a-half-story projecting bay.


The house's foundation material, probable masonry, is covered in parged cementicious material. Most of the windows are one-overone sash, although the front bay windows of the south (front) facade have ornamental fix glass panes over large clear ones. On the front facade, a door, leading to the top of the porch, has been cut out on the second floor. The roofing material is asphalt shingle.

The central front dormer is pedimented, has pilasters, closed diamond-pattern windows, and clapboarded flanks and tympanum.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

This house is one of few built as late as 1910 on Block 49. It replaced an older house on the same sight; the earlier house was moved to the rear of Lot 12. (See Building-Structure Inventory Form for $71^{1/2}$ East Second Street).
