
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- 11c. MAJOR ALTERATIONS: The house was either drastically altered or completely rebuilt between 1903 and 1908. The only addition to the house, a rear, raised wooden deck, was made by the present owners in 1987.
- 15i. LANDSCAPE FEATURES: The property takes up only half of city Lot 13 in Block 49. The house banks into a hill, exposing the rear of the basement.
- 18. NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE: This house has simple rectangular massing, but complex roofline patterns. The front third of the house is a two-story rectangular mass. The ridgeline of this section runs parallel to Second Street and is disrupted by an off-center front gable. The front gable delineates the main entrance of the house. A two-and-one-half-story gable end section intersects the lower, front portion of the house.

The building's foundation material is masonry parged in a cementicious material, which is decorated with swirled patterns. Windows throughout the house are one-over-one sash. The roofing material is asphalt shingle. A central brick chimney flue emerges from the rear two-and-one-half-story section of the house.

Of interest are the second story double doors, positioned just off-center on the front facade. These twelve-light doors open onto the flat-roofed Colonial Revival-style front porch. The one-bay entry porch boasts a raised floor, tripled Doric columns at the exterior corners, a wrought iron balustrade and railing around the floor and roof, and a lattice skirt. This one of few Colonial Revival style porches found in Block 49.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: According to the Sanborn Maps, this house was constructed circa 1903 on the site of an earlier residence. According to the present owners, the extant house was built around 1865. This date may relate to the earlier structure. The present house appears to have been a rental property in the early twentieth-century.
