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11c. MAJOR ALTERATIONS AND DATES:

The current 180 East Second Street replaces an older house on the site constructed ea. 1876. This ca. 1907 building may be the house designed for Mrs. W. S. Dickinson in 1907 as Job No. 1046 by the Elmira architectural firm of Pierce and Bickford. Mrs. Dickinson was the owner of the property during the house's period of construction, but a specific attribution is not clear since another design (assumed destroyed) was done by Pierce and Bickford for Mrs. Dickinson the previous year. There has been one modern addition done to the house, a two-story block at the southeast corner which was added in 1989. The rear porch was enclosed in 1985.

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

The house at 80 East Second Street has a shallow front yard with a moderately steep set of concrete steps leading from both the base of the porch and the west sideyard to the sidewalk. Another set of steps goes from the sidewalk to the street. So what how this till now that age, shyle, ele.?

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE:

Colonial Rennal

This house was constructed ca. 1907, but has had its exterior siding ? flood? replaced and a modern two-story addition placed at the rear. The irregular eaves and shingled porch with classical columns point to the Shingle Style as a likely source of design elements. Other decorative elements include a line of brackets along the overhanging gable end and a leaded glass window on the eastern facade. The parged foundation on the main block has been scored to resemble stone.

The house is a two-and-a-half story gable-front structure with two cross-gables. The gable-on-hip cross-gable on the eastern facade is pierced by a chimney with a corbeled cap. The gable-on-hip cross-gable on the western facade is accented by an anusually low eave which defines the extended bay.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES..(continued):

The front facade has one-over-one cottage sash, while the rest of the house has a variety of one-over-one sash sizes. The front porch is supported by classically inspired columns seated on a solide wood-shingled balustrade. The what we square-cornered porch wraps around the northwest corner of the house. The front to say door is a large, working Dutch door with a light in the top section.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

This house was constructed to replace an earlier structure on the same lot. The entire property was purchased by Walter S. Dickinson in 1887. His widow immediately came into possession of the property and lived in the original house until around 1907. At that time, a new house was constructed. The 1907 design identified as Job No. 1046 in the records of the Pierce and Bickford architectural firm of Elmira was commissioned by Mrs. W. S. Dickinson, but it is not clear whether this is the same house. An earlier design done for Mrs. Dickinson is thought to have been destroyed. During the 1930s, Mrs. George Dickinson ran a cosmetic manufacture operation and beauty salon from the residence. The new house at 80 East Second Street remained in the Dickinson family until the late 1940s.
