11c. MAJOR ALTERATIONS AND DATES:

The uncoursed stone veneer of the gabled wall dormer was probably added in the late 1950s. The house was reclad with vinyl siding in 1979. The garage is original, and has a paneled door dating from the early 1980s. Paired one-over-one double-hung sash replaced centered paired six-over-six double-hung sash on the first story level of the north facade sometime in the 1950s. An interior birch chimney was added in the early 1960s. The asphalt roof was replaced with similar roofing material in 1983.

15i. RELATED OUTBUILDINGS AND PROPERTY:

The house has a garage attached to the northeast corner of the facade.

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

The structure is consistent with its neighbors in size, east-to-west separation, and setback.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE:

The two-story house at 5 West Sixth Street is a modified vernacular interpretation of the Cape Cod Gabled Cottage, as described in Gottfried and Jennings' <u>American Vernacular Design</u>, 1870-1940. Features identifying it as this type of vernacular cottage are the steeply pitched gable roof with a low gable on the facade, a gable dormer with a six-over-six double-hung sash, and a cutaway porch with an entrance door at center.

The south (main) facade is dominated by a gabled wall dormer covering the western half of the facade. The first story level of the gabled wall dormer has an uncoursed stone veneer. On the first story level of the gabled wall dormer, projecting bay windows are set on canted walls beneath a flaired hip roof. The windows are casement sash with eight lights. The gable end has aluminum siding. The eastern half of the facade, adjacent to the gabled wall dormer, has a cutaway porch supported by square wooden posts set beneath shallow arches. The entrance is placed beneath the porch, and is centered on the facade. There is a six-over-six double-hung sash between the entrance and the southeast corner. Centered in the gable on the facade, and adjacent to the gable roof of the wall dormer, there is a gabled dormer with a six-over-six double-hung sash.

The west facade features two sets of six-over-six double-hung sash, one on each story. There is a smaller double-hung sash near the northwest corner on the first story level. The east facade consists of a six-over-six double-hung window centered on the first story level. and paired six-over-six double-hung sash centered on the second-story level.

The north facade consists of a projecting bay covering the northeast third of the facade, and a similar bay covering the northwest third of the facade. There is a paneled entrance door with twelve lights on the first story level of the west projecting bay. The fenestration is irregular, consisting mostly of six-over-six double-hung sash and casement windows with multiple lights, with the exception of paired one-over-one double-hung sash (cottage sash?), which are centered on the first story level of the facade. An interior brick chimney rises from the shed roof of the west projecting bay.

bay window on the south facade has texture 1-11 siding. The house sits on an uncoursed stone foundation parged with poured concrete.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

The house is constructed on Lot #15 of Block 70, as laid out in the 1855 Brewer and Canfield map of Corning.

The house was built in 1927, during a period when the property was owned by the prosperous Houghton family of Corning. [I have had difficulty making sense of information in deeds. At one point, I cou;dn't find a deed (prior to Houghtons), so I've decided to list what I have below.]
