

# 17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

Sitting on the north side of East Third Street this residence has a similar setback from the street as its neighbors. However, unlike the neighboring residences which were constructed as single family homes, this structure was originally built as a two family residence.

#### 18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE:

This large residence with its steeply pitched and cross gabled roof displays some typical features of the Queen Anne Style of architecture. It also has the typical mix of siding material that is often seen with the Queen Anne Style; clapboards on the main part of the house and decorative wood shingles in the gable ends.

The front (south) facade of 131-133-135 East Third Street is symmetrically balanced, with a centered front facing gable that extends out from the main structure. The perpendicular cross gables face east and west. The front facing gable has the typical clipped lower corners so often seen in the Queen Anne Style. Two identical entrance porches are built in the corners of the T that is formed where the front gable projects out from the main part of the house. These two porches extend out past the front gable. The gable ends of these two porches repeat the same shingle pattern that is seen on the gable ends of the main house. The porch supports are highly decorative turned columns. The porch railings are open and constructed of wrought iron. On the east facade there is a small projecting square shaped bay that extends up from the basement to the first floor. It has a shed style roof. The west facade has the exact same features as the east facade. The rear (north) side of this structure has two enclosed back porches. One is located on the eastern most side of this rear facade. The other is located on the western most end. Both porches have shed style roofs.

### 20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

This structure was originally built as a two family dwelling. It housed workmen from the local Corning community. Among those taking up residence in this house were Mr. Edward Brace, who was a piano tuner and Mr. Max Phillips, who managed the Guarantee Clothing Company at 28 East Market Street. This building was owned by Mr. Louis Lindner who never lived in the structure, but apparently owned it as a source of income property. This structure continues to exist today as multiple dwelling unit. It has three apartments at the present time.
