# 11c. MAJOR ALTERATIONS AND DATES:

c.1. Removal of one-story entrance porch on west facade between 1908 and 1913

c.2. Addition of enclosed frame porch 4' deep by 12' wide, at an unknown date after 1930.

c.3. Installation of vertical vinyl siding on the gable ends.

### 17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

Situated on the west side of Wall Street, this house is one of a series of Queen Annestyle buildings. These buildings are examples of different variations within the style. This structure integrates well with this interesting group of similarly massed buildings of the Free-Classic and simplified Queen Ann-style, while contrasting with the urban Queen Anne building located at the other side of the street. These houses have similar setbacks but their north to south spacing is considerably wider to the north side of this building.

#### 18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE:

A large two-story structure under a hipped roof this Queen Anne-style, two unit structure has a pair of symmetrical cross gables over two projecting wings on the main facade flanking the main recessed entrance. The gable ends has simplified returns and vertical vinyl siding. A one-story, full-width porch is attached to the main (east) facade. It has a flat roof, turned porch posts, lattice skirt and metallic handrails and balustrades. Other important features are wide windows with one-over-one double-hung sash, an enclosed porch on the rear and composite shingles on the roof. The foundation is made of cast stone.

## 20. HISTORICALAND ARCHITECTURALIMPORTANCE

Originally a part of Lot #8 on Block #48, probably the first owner of this parcel was R. P. Perry, who bought the south part of Lot #8. Before 1888 a building was constructed in the south end of the site. Later, between 1903 and 1908 a two-unit building was constructed at the north side of the site. This structure is known today as 133 and 135 Wall Street. Since its construction the building has had a large number of different occupants through time, which suggests that most of the time both units were rented. Current owners and occupants of 133 Wall Street are Sidney and Mable Kahn. The owner of 135 Wall Street since 1957 is Richard Kurchey. Some of the previous occupants of 135 Wall Street have been Samuel K. Walcott, president of 81 Wall Corning Automobile Co. (during 1913 to 1914), and George W. Ryan from Ryan Loan Co. (during the early '30s).
