11c. MAJOR ALTERATIONS AND DATES:

This building was constructed ca. 1903-05 by owners William E. and

Bessie C. Kimball. Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps first show the house on the sentence this site in 1908, while directory information indicates the house as being occupied from 1905 forward. The only significant alteration is the early removal of twin single-story porches from the rear of the building.

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

This building was placed facing Wall Street in order to take advantage of the extra frontage of this corner lot. The original 63' x 165' lot facing onto East Second Street has been divided to accommodate three houses of varying proportions, all of which have functioned as multi-unit housing. Both the 187 and 183 Wall Street houses have shallow front yards at a slight south-to-north slope.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE:

This divided double, is a late and somewhat symmetrical adaptation of the Queen Anne Style. Decorative elements include a hip roof with deck and four wood-shingled cross-gables. The full-width front porch features simple, classically-inspired wood columns with balustrades and latticework skirting. The paired entrances are centrally positioned beneath a shallow compediment at the front of the shallow porch roof. There are three-part window bays on either side of the entrance, with sottage-width one-over-one sash in the central part of each bay.

The house is clad entirely in clapboard, while the foundation is rough-cut rubble, irregularly coursed. Gable ends are flared, and finished and in coursed wood shingles, around small paired one-over-one sash. There are two cutaway bays on the north side of the building with the same one-over-one sash that is prominent throughout the building. There is also shed-roofed porchion both the north and south sides of the building, with narrow side walks leading to these supplemental rear entrances.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

This house was constructed ca. 1903-05 on the central portion of the corner lot at the intersection of East Second and Wall Streets. The building was constructed immediately after the southern half of athe two subdivided corner lot was sold to William E. and Bessie Kimball in 1903. Since directory information does not show them in residence at this address, this divided double was probably originally intended to bean income property. The first resident of this property was Dr. Harry H. Hubbell, who lived in the house until 1914. There have been several long-term residents of the property including Dr. Hubbell (1905-1914) and subsequent owners Solomon H. and Essie L. Stone (owners 1921-24), Russell M. and Achsa Searle (owners 1924-26), and B. Frank Towne and Erma Towne (owners in succession 1924-1971).
