The main two-story block and rear additions are sided in several different widths of clapboard, while the front porch is clad in wood shingles on the first story and aluminum on the smaller second story porch. The irregularly coursed fieldstone foundation has lost much of its mortar. The asphalt shingled roof is complicated by separate pitches on the hipped roofs of the main block and large addition, as well as the shallow shed roof on the rear addition.

The house has two front doorways on the first floor with wide flat casings to accommodate the modern doors. Another doorway opens onto
