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11c. MAJOR ALTERATIONS AND DATES: No major alterations have occurred since the house was built.

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

This structure is located on the corner of East Third and Wall Streets. This house shares the same shallow set back from the street as its neighbors. However, this building was built at a much later date than the houses that are immediately adjacent to it.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE:

This large multi gabled structure was built as a two family residence, which is the same function it serves today. This house has a simple rectangular shape with a gable on each of the four sides. The main gable lies parallel to Wall Street, with the ends of this main gable facing north and south. The cross gable faces east and west but does not project out from the main part of the house.

The front(west) facade of 198-200 Wall Street is symmetrical, with an identical hexagonal shaped porch projecting from both the northwest and south west corners of this house. These two porches wrap around the house and extend about a third of the way along the north and south ends of the structure. The two simple entrance doors are located side by side with a hipped roof that extends out over these entrance doors. Concrete steps and an entrance porch of coursed stone provide access to the two entrance doors. The main body of the house is sided with wood clapboards. The gable ends have been resided with aluminum. The lower half of the two wrap a round porches are sided with wood shingles.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

This two family residence provided rental housing housing for many people over the years. This property was probably owned by John Clark . Mr. Clark was the owner of John L. Clark Boots And Shoes. In fact, Mr. Clarks boyhood home used to be sited on this location. However that house was moved to a lot immediately to the east of what is now 198-200 Wall Street; to 105 East Third Street. That occurred around 1909. Some of the people who resided at 198-200 Wall Street were; John Rolfe, the managing editor of the Evening Leader; and John Shaw, advertising manager at Corning Glass Works.
