

## 11. INTEGRITY:

Originally known as 503 Walnut Street, this house was built in 1903 and the Sanborn maps indicate no additions up through 1948. The single-story vinyl-sided extension on the rear of the house was probably constructed after 1948.

Vinyl siding has recently been installed on the upper floor, the eaves, the gable faces and the turret at the southeast corner of the house.

### 17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

The section of Walnut Street between the alley to the north of West First Street and West First Street itself has a total of six buildings, none of which are used as a primary residence by the owners of the properties. There are three social organizations, an orthodontist and a funeral home, among others, in this area. There is no consistent massing or style of building in this one block area of Walnut Street and the buildings on the west side of Walnut are overshadowed by the two larger buildings on the east side of Walnut Street.

Walnut Street is a busy thoroughfare that serves as a major arterial into the Southside neighborhood. On-street parking further divides Walnut Street into two unrelated halves, adding to the lack of identity in this neighborhood. One of the buildings on this side of the street dates from 1857 or earlier, unlike the other side of West First Street. Finally, there is a church in this row of residences that further detracts from the whole.

### 18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE:

This two-and-a-half-story house has elements of the Queen Anne and Italianate styles. Since the house substantially post-dates the Greek Revival style one can attribute this house to an eclectic property owner or architect who wanted to combine elements of many styles into this house.

There is a one-and-a-half-story projecting tower form with a tent shaped roof on the southeast corner of the house. The front gable has cornice returns, reminiscent of

the Greek Revival Style, that are supported by brackets that are Italianate style in nature. The front gable also has adopted a Gambrel shape in the flair at the bottom and it has a three part window on its facade beneath the cornice.

The entire top floor has been clad in white vinyl siding but the first floor remains brick, which appears to be its original material. There are two small outbuildings built after 1948 directly to the rear of the building as well as a flagpole on the front lawn.

The front porch is constructed of brick which does not match the other brick on the first floor. In addition, the current configuration of the porch does not match the full width of the porch shape shown on the 1948 Sanborn map. This indicates that the porch may have been removed in the interim and rebuilt. Finally, the turret form on the southeast corner of the house does not show up on any of the Sanborn maps, which could indicate an oversight on the map maker's part.

#### 20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

Originally part of the parcel owned by the Nelson Lockwood Somers family up until the turn of the century, the building has been used by the American Legion as their Corning headquarters since after World War II.
