

11c. Between 1903 and 1908, the front porch was extended around to the south side of house. Also a small rear entry porch may have been added on the alley side (north).

- 17. This house is located on the east side of Walnut Street in a residential neighborhood. This section of Walnut Street contains primarily vernacular Queen Anne-style residences, but other styles are represented as well. The size and setback of this house from the street are similar to those of other houses on Walnut Street. The lot size is similar to the others on the same block of Walnut Street.
- 18. This two-and-a-half-story, cross-gabled, wood-frame residence possesses ornamental features that identify it as a product of the mid-to-late-nineteenth century. These features include vertical siding in an inverted picket design in the gable ends, and the tall two-over-two-light windows that represent the primary window type on the house.

The three-bay front facade, which faces west, has windows in each bay on each story except for the northern bay on the first story, which contains the front door. A one-story porch with square columns and wide capitals extends across the front of the house and wraps around a short distance onto the south facade.

The gable end has a narrow, one-over-one-light double-hung sash.

The south facade contains no windows whatsoever on the front half. The cross gable on the north facade contains the same type of window and inverted picket design as does the front gable.

20. Evidence from maps suggests that this house was built between 1882, when it does not appear on the bird's-eye view map of Corning, and 1893, when it appears on city engineer Harry C. Heermans' map. Certain stylistic elements, however, such as the squarish massing, Italianate-style two-over-two-light windows, and the vertical siding in an inverted picket design, point to a slightly earlier date of construction, perhaps in the 1870s. The property was purchased in 1873 by Mary Maltby; on her death in 1886 she devised the property to her husband, Jerome B. Maltby, a prosperous wholesale grocer.

The first known occupant of the house was Robert Allison, a travelling salesman for C. R. Maltby & Brother, wholesale grocers, of which Jerome B. Maltby was the brother. Allison lived here from at least 1893 to about 1904. In his will, Jerome Maltby named Robert Allison as one of his employees to whom he would bequeath \$50 providing he remained an employee at the time of his death.

In 1905, also during the Maltby ownership, Mrs. Frances B. Waterbury and several of her grown, unmarried children lived

in this house. The Waterburys occupied the house until the 1910s, possibly until Jerome Maltby's death in 1914.

By 1917, George A. Sheehe, of McGammon & Sheehe, dry goods, had moved in, and in 1919 his wife, Anne L. Sheehe, had purchased the property from Jerome Maltby's executors. In the mid-1930s, George Sheehe left his former occupation to become proprietor of The Sheehe Shoppe, a "ladies ready to wear" shop on Pine Street. After George and Anne Sheehe died in the 1950s, the property was transferred to Margaret M. Sheehe, who was a clerk and bookkeeper in her father's shops. Subsequent owners have been owner-occupants.
